Trichodrymonia lacera

[formerly Paradrymonia lacera]

At the plant sale at the Wilmington, Delaware convention, I picked up a small plant labeled *Paradrymonia lacera*. I showed it to Jim Roberts and asked him about it. He paused and said it was interesting. Since I like interesting, I bought it.

According to information provided on the IUCN Red List site, *Trichodrymonia lacera* grows as a terrestrial or epiphytic plant at 500m to 1000m in forests in western Ecuador. It has been collected at two sites. The Red List classifies it as endangered.

My plant growing areas have humidity levels that can go as low as 20% to 30%, so I put it in a terrarium. For the first year, because of lack of space, I kept it in a small terrarium. About a year ago, I put it in a larger terrarium to allow it to grow larger. It is growing in chopped, long-fibered, sphagnum moss placed on a small amount of bonsai soil and Azomite, placed over horticultural charcoal, which provides drainage. Azomite is a ground volcanic rock that contains a large number of minerals.

A few weeks ago, my plant started blooming. The blooms are creamy white, and have lasted for weeks. They seem to have narrow linear bracts that sometimes curl around the bloom or each other; I haven't taken any plant material out to look more closely at it. Leaves are narrow, 3 to 4 inches long, symmetrical, medium green, and have a serrated margin. The plant is about 11 inches tall, but I suspect that it would be taller if grown in soil in a humid environment. In 2016 Paradrymonia lacera was renamed Trichodrymonia lacera. I'm really enjoying growing this 'interesting' plant. The next time I repot it, I'll take cuttings so that others can enjoy growing it.

Moussonia elegans

I dumped the pot with my dormant *Moussonia elegans* looking for rhizomes and was quite surprised to find a tuber like structure with very wood like roots. I then went on the Gesneriad Reference Web and it does mention that this genus is in the rhizomatous section but that it doesn't form rhizomes.

This plant and flower reminds me of a kohleria.

Sinningia 'Solar Flare', 2016, IR161349, hybridized by Ray Coyle, NY ((*S.* 'Apricot Bouquet' x *S. araneosa*) x *S. amambayensis*). Cross made June 2010, planted Sept. 2010, and first flowered Oct. 2011. Fertile, reproducible only vegetatively. Multicrowned, non-branching, stem length 25 cm. Leaves medium green, 10 cm long, 6-8 cm wide, with 2 cm petiole, ovate with cuneate base, crenate margin and acute tip. Calyx split, green, 0.5 cm long. Pedicel 2-3 cm with 1 flower per axil. Corolla campanulate 4 cm long x 2.5 cm wide, peach with pale yellow center and wavy petal tips.

Plants and People: a heady mix

On 14 January here in Eastern Australia we held a Combined Gesneriad Meeting at my home. This is at least the 14th Annual Combined Meeting. I don't have any record or photographs before 2005 but I suspect there were one or two meetings earlier.

In Australia, although there are a reasonable number of people interested in growing gesneriads, societies are few and far between. In all cases they are principally African violet groups with an interest in the other gesneriad plants. Both the Sydney based African Violet Association of Australia and the Hunter Valley African Violet Society have separate extra meetings for their members who wish to pursue their interest in gesneriads in a more intense way. What could be more natural than to have a combined meeting in my home as I am situated somewhere between the two? This combined meeting has always been open to all other African violet groups and anyone that we can encourage who is not a member (yet!) who has an interest in gesneriads. We regularly have people attend from Queensland and have had visitors from other states in the past. It is always great to meet with growers whom we may see only rarely. Attendance is usually around 30; a good friendly number.

Most of our meetings have two or three topics of interest with a person appointed for each to give a lead to the discussion. But occasionally it is different. At one meeting a couple of years ago we had Dale Martens present by Skype to join in our discussion, and last year we viewed the Gesneriad Society webinar on Achimenes. This time we took as our theme "Everything Miniature in Gesneriads". Naturally the main thrust was miniature sinningias as they are the most common and arguably the most loved. Sue Hodges did a sterling job in talking on that subject showing us both some old favourites as well as some new hybrids. Discussion on other

miniature gesneriads was more general. Gesneriads we considered included the numerous Diastema, Phinaea, Petrocosmea, Gesneria, as well as Kohleria 'Flirt', Episcia 'Silver Dust', E. 'Silver Skies' and E. 'Toy Silver', Deinostigma tamiana, Streptocarpus muscosus and others, as well as the really knotty question: What makes a gesneriad a miniature?






Gesneriad Society Webinars
