

Primulina ophiopogoides Karyn Cichocki < kdc05@ptd.net > Lafayette, New Jersey, USA



I received this plant in 2016 from Paul Kroll (thanks Paul) labeled as *Primulina wentsaii*. When I watered my plants on February 6, prior to going to San Diego, there were no buds showing. Two weeks later while watering I noticed stems above the leaves with buds on them. For a primulina, this was virtually overnight.

Once I saw that the flowers were going to be light pink, I realized that this plant was actually *Primulina ophiopogoides* because *P. wentsaii* blooms are a blue/purple color.

This is a slow growing plant for me. I have it growing in stones to mimic the limestone rocks it naturally grows in.





Several years ago, Paul had given me a plant labeled as *P. wentsaii*. Not long after, I noticed that the leaves were covered with a white residue. Without consulting anyone, I assumed this was powdery mildew and commenced to spray it over a period of time with a fungicide. Well, either the fungicide or the spraying killed the plant. This current plant doesn't have as much of the normal white residue on the leaves.

I've gotten leaves before but have been unsuccessful in getting them to root. The first time I kept the soil too wet and they rotted. The second time I kept the soil on the dry side and although the leaves lasted about six months they never rooted and finally dried up.

My Gesneriad Journey

I have enjoyed my first year's membership in The Gesneriad Society and am looking forward to 2018. I do have a long history of gesneriad involvement, and I think it is a little bit interesting. I will try to keep it to one page.

My mother grew African violets continuously at home from my earliest memories in the early 50s. She was a very good grower, using steaming hot water from the tea kettle carefully added to the saucer used to hold each plant. My only contribution involved an occasional careless knocking over of one of these beauties and feeling really bad at the mess on the floor.

Fast forward 20 years, I'm now in graduate school studying chemistry. I bought a simple African violet at a supermarket as a gift for my wife, Alice. She liked it "okay," but from that day forward I was hooked on all things "gesneriad."

In 1976 my Mother had an "unusual" trailing plant with flashy reddish orange and yellow tubular flowers growing near her kitchen window. I took just a little cutting and 41 years later *Columnea* 'Early Bird' is still growing and blooming profusely in my dining room window. It is of course magnificent and I have started countless divisions and cuttings over the years.

As newlyweds, my wife and I began to vacation each summer in the Adirondack Mountains. In 1973 I discovered Lyndon Lyon Greenhouses in nearby Dolgeville, NY! OMG!!

I talked with Lyndon Lyon on numerous occasions in his extensive greenhouse. He was a very enthusiastic and kindly, gentle man. One time he escorted me to his home basement growing area full of new gesneriad hybrids. I remember he was especially proud of his latest kohleria hybrids. Another year, there were two large newly installed portable greenhouses in his side yard! He was now growing and hybridizing miniature roses! He loved those roses and was very excited about his new hybridizing venture.

Another year (late 70s), I made my annual visit to Lyndon Lyon and I saw a brand new Lincoln Continental parked next to the greenhouse. Pretty fancy, to say the least. I walked into the greenhouse and there was John T. Connor, former Secretary of Commerce and (then) the chief executive officer of Allied Chemical Corp., my employer! His wife, finely dressed and bejeweled, was busy selecting some African violets. I did not have the courage to say to Mr. Connor that I am a research chemist back at "your" corporate headquarters in Morristown, NJ. What a coincidence!

I joined The Gesneriad Society in January 2017 and received a packet with a generous mixture of seeds which I planted on 02-28-17. I was very excited when two seedlings appeared in late March! The identical rhizomatous seedlings bloomed six months later: *Kohleria hirsuta*. I've never grown kohlerias before and they are blooming happily in my basement greenhouse alongside my orchids and tillandsias. My great-great grandfather's surname was Kohler.

My wife and I will attend the convention in Boston if at all possible. See you then!






