

Growing Gesneriads in the Desert


One of the major decisions I had to make when we moved from South Huntington, NY to Palm Springs in December of 2019 had to do with my plants, plant stands and light fixtures. I decided that I would offer the stands and fixtures to whomever in the chapter wanted them and Barbara Hanft and Kathy Do quickly snatched them up (I hope that they are enjoying them). I also decided that I did not want to have to worry about transporting plants cross country – we were flying and I didn't think it wise to try and ship plants in the month of December. So, with the exception of two tubers (*Sinningia leucotricha* 'Telemaco Borba' MP0016 and *S*. 'Kevin Garnett') and a few achimenes rhizomes, all the plants in my collection were either given to friends or brought to a meeting for the raffle and sales tables.

By mid-fall of 2020 I started thinking about setting up a light stand. I knew that I would use LED fixtures and, based on the advice given by several Gesneriad Society members in convention talks (both Gesneriad Society live and AVSA virtual), I purchased four 48" LED 4200K fixtures with 4000 lumens online direct from Sunco. While the fixtures seem to have two fluorescent tubes in them,

these are really plastic coverings for the diodes which produce the light. I also purchased metro shelving (to which I added wheels) with four adjustable shelves – less expensive than standard grow carts.



My original intent was to use all four shelves for growing gesneriads. However, because of the intensity of the LEDs, I had to position the two shelves with gesneriads farther away from the lights than I had intended and will use the other two shelves for storage and succulents. Several chapter members offered to send me plants and cuttings to kickstart my new collection and, as a result of the generosity of Mel Grice and Levente Hajdu, I now have twenty-three healthy primulinas, with four in flower and another two or three showing buds, plus the two aforementioned sinningias and three orchids. I am still experimenting with



plant placement, but it doesn't seem that any of the gesneriads are suffering, burning, or otherwise headed to plant heaven.

What is the big deal you may ask everything seems to be going well. The big deal is humidity – right now, it's 11% in the condo. The A/C is not on, the heat isn't on – it's just the desert. So, I had to make a few decisions. At first the cuttings and small plants were put under domes. However, I realized that I would have to enclose the light stand because these plants would soon outgrow the plastic domes. I also would have to change how I water my plants. I have always grown on capillary matting but I didn't think that would work here. The mats would most likely dry out rather quickly and they really wouldn't

substantially add to the ambient humidity. The solution was to switch to growing

almost everything on wicks. I had never done this before and didn't want to have little plastic containers that I would have to fill with water periodically. I also didn't want to have to deal with baggies of water in each container. So, I decided to use egg crate cut to fit on top of the black plastic trays that I fill halfway with water. Each pot (which is filled with a very light mix) has a wick and the wick sits in the community water source – and all the primulinas are loving



it. In fact, I am getting better growth and more bloom from many of them, especially *P. petrocosmeoides*. I think I hear a few "no no no" comments now – aren't you afraid of spreading bugs?!?! Actually, not overly so. I will start using

a systemic insecticide (imidacloprid, sold as Marathon*) as a prophylaxis in each pot and, should the dreaded mealies strike, propagation is only a leaf cutting away. The only exceptions to wicking are the sinningias and the orchids. I have them sitting in saucers in one of the trays and fill the tray with water about halfway up the side of the saucers. One orchid is in bloom and another in spike, so they seem to be enjoying the environment, where they have been growing for over three months.

Here are my growing basics:

- Commercial, off the shelf potting mix with equal parts of perlite (1:1)
- Lights are on ten hours a day
- Plants are either 11" or 13" from the lights (top of the pot to the lights)
- Humidity in the enclosed light unit ranges from 50% -65% and the temperature from 65° - 80°F
- I add water to the trays once a week, mixed with full-strength tomato fertilizer
